Welcome to the 2nd edition of the Hockey Helps the Homeless Annual Report.

What a year it's been. As a foray into what you'll see on the following pages, you'll notice that the theme for this annual report is "new frontiers." With that in mind, I am thrilled to share that we have broken all of our previous records and total gross revenue for the year came in at just over \$4,500,000. Net raised for charity came in at \$2,650,000, which is an increase of over 15% versus last year. A large contributor to our success once again was the increase in peer-to-peer fundraising which was up by 16% vs. prior years – totaling over \$2,900,000. Over the past 3 years we have increased our net raised for charity by over 50%. Our ability to achieve these outcomes come as a result of the combined effort of over 1,000 volunteers across the country, supported by our committees in each city, working in collaboration with our 6 full-time staff.

In recognition of our collective achievements, we were proud to be named one of the Top 5 P-2-P Fundraising Programs in Canada as ranked by the P2P Professional Forum. In addition, we broke into new territory and successfully launched a new website and online fundraising platform and tournaments in both Halifax, NS and Mississauga, ON raising \$50,000 and \$75,000 respectively.

But the need continues. Now more than ever, homeless and at-risk Canadians need our help. To combat the issue, Hockey Helps the Homeless is preparing to continue to grow and launch 7 new Tournament sites in the next 3 seasons:

Alongside our existing events, HHTH will host tournaments in 18 cities nationwide, raising funds and awareness for 50+ local homeless support agencies. We've also increased our staff compliment by 2 to support our growth plans and we gladly welcome Brandi Awad, Marketing and Communications, and Brian Steinman, Tournament Operations, as the newest members of the HHTH family.

I want to thank our National Founding Sponsor, Canada Life, for their continued support and belief in our mission. Without them, we wouldn't make nearly the impact we do.

INAUGURAL WINNIPEG TOURNAMENT


December 6, 2019 marks the first-ever Winnipeg tournament, the home of our National Founding Sponsor, Canada Life.

THE FIRST HHTH EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM

YOUR IMPACT IN K-W

HOMELESSNESS & HOUSING UMBRELLA GROUP (HHUG) (\$45,000)

The 2018 K-W tournament will support the core work of Homelessness and Housing Umbrella Group (HHUG) which includes offering low-cost training to staff and volunteers of agencies and groups working in the housing stability sector. ALL IN 2020 is an enormous community mobilization initiative aimed at increasing awareness and resources to end chronic homelessness by Nov, 2020

ONEROOF YOUTH SERVICES (\$45,000)

Thanks to you, oneRoof Youth Services operates a youth specific (ages 16-25) shelter with 17 co-ed shelter beds, providing for the safety, security, and well-being of the most vulnerable population. Not only do they provide beds, but also life skills development, basic necessities, intensive care management, crisis management, family mediation, support, advocacy, and goal setting.

HOUSE OF FRIENDSHIP (\$45,000)

Your donation to House of Friendship will support the Charles Street Men's Shelter which focuses on getting men into permanent housing. HHTH will help fund the hiring of a Program Resource Worker who meets with the men who enter the Shelter and develops an individualized, permanent housing search plan and provides a one-to-one connection with a customized level of support based on the individual's needs and requirements.

LUTHERWOOD (\$45,000)

Funds will support Lutherwood's Safe Haven Shelter which is a 10 bed shelter for vulnerable youth between the ages of 12 and 18. HHTH will ensure that Lutherwood is able to maintain staffing to support youth accessing services including life and social skills programming. At the shelter, youth are provided with their basic needs, and a discharge/housing plan which may include reintegration into their family unit, independent living, or supportive housing options.

YWCA KITCHENER-WATERLOO (\$42,000)

The YW Emergency Shelter will continue to operate their 66-bed shelter for homeless women and families because of your help. They provide basic necessities, crisis support, and housing help to approximately 350 adults and 150 children and youth each year.

YOUR IMPACT IN CALGARY

YWCA CALGARY (\$58,000)

YW Mary Dover House transitional housing provides emergency and short-term supportive housing beds for women experiencing homelessness. Not only do they provide housing, they also offer case management which supports women to achieve their goals and ultimately transition them into a community successfully. HHTH will help fund YWCA Calgary's transition to a new custom facility which expands their operations to include 20 emergency and 80 supportive beds.

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF CALGARY (\$58,000)

With your help, the funds raised will support the hiring of an Independent Living Key Worker for Avenue 15. Avenue 15 offers an alternative to life on the street as well as opportunities that support development for youth ages 12-17. The Key Worker will support youth to achieve their personal goals and to overcome the obstacles and barriers that caused and kept them homeless. They will help youth plan, strategize, follow through on goals, and walk alongside youth



INN FROM THE COLD (\$58,000)

Families come to the Inn seeking not only these supports along with basic necessities of food, shelter, and clothing, but they also arrive searching for a safe place for their children. They seek a place to call home, somewhere where they can be supported on their journey to find housing for their family, where they don't have to worry each day and night about the safety of their children's environment as they sleep, eat, and grow. Funds from HHTH will fund the upgrades to the emergency exit lighting in the building and bring signage up to code, as well as purchase a large cube van to assist the Inn in picking up and collecting donations and heavy items.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY SOUTHERN ALBERTA (\$58,000)


Funds raised from the 2018 tournament will help support the Silver Creek Legacy Build. The Silvercreek Legacy Build is Habitat's largest project to date, featuring affordable multi-family homes for 32 working families with children. The design includes four buildings with 8-unit stacked townhouses, the requisite parking, and a family playground. Each home is roughly 1,100 square feet with three bedrooms, one and a half bathrooms, and an open concept main floor.





After the inaugural Halifax tournament, net proceeds have funded the first-ever VETS Canada Veteran's Drop-In and Support Centre in Nova Scotia. Located at 170 Ochterlony Street in Dartmouth, the centre celebrated their official grand opening on March 13, 2019 and will provide aid and comfort to Canadian veterans that are in-crisis, are at risk of becoming homeless, or are homeless. It provides a safe place where veterans and RCMP members can come for immediate help and support. They also have access to the veteran's resource centre, and can stop by for a coffee or a bite to eat. The centre includes trained social services personnel and veteran peer volunteers on-site who will have a range of immediate supports that include housing, clothing, food and transportation that will be provided to veterans and their families as needed. Access to supports is important to help veterans maintain their relationships and mental health, find civilian employment, manage injuries and illnesses, and reduce social isolation.

From this project, VETS Canada estimates that they will be able to help around 240 veterans per year from the centre. Over 1,500 homeless veterans and veterans in crisis have been supported by VETS Canada throughout Nova Scotia since 2014.

YOUR IMPACT IN HALIFAX

VETS CANADA (\$50,000)

Working within the community, VETS Canada members attempt to move veterans from the streets or shelters into affordable housing. They also connect veterans with needed health care, access to benefits and services from other organizations, and support them in finding suitable employment. VETS Canada volunteers support with these veterans every step of the way and do everything possible to help them re-establish themselves.

The first annual HHTH Halifax Tournament in 2018 funded VETS Canada's Veteran's Drop-In and Support Centre. Their centre is the first of its kind in Nova Scotia and works to provide immediate support to Canadian veterans and RCMP members that are at-risk of becoming homeless, in-crisis or those who are homeless. The centre will provide a range of different supports including housing, clothing, food and transportation for veterans and their families as needed.

YOUR IMPACT IN YORK REGION

360°KIDS (\$140,500)

Funds raised from the HHTH York Region tournament supports the Transitions program at 360° kids, which provides affordable, furnished rental apartments to youth aged 17 - 26 so they can continue to work or attend school through subsidized rent. With this initiative, youth won't have to constantly worry about having a roof over their head while trying to lead a productive and healthy life. The funding from Hockey Helps the Homeless assists with subsidizing the youth's rent over the program, as well as associated program operating costs such as the Program Coordinator. The Program Coordinator works directly with each of the youth assisting them with maintaining their housing and connecting them with additional community resources.

An example of the great impact that HHTH supporters have accomplished was just last year with the grand opening of 17 Mill Street, a new home for 3 youths in the Transitions program.





THROUGH THE SUPPORT OF HHTH, 360°KIDS HAS BEEN ABLE TO PROVIDE 14 YOUTH WITH SUPPORTS IN 9 APARTMENTS OVER THE PAST 2 YEARS.

HOCKEY WITH HEART (\$30,000)

Hockey with Heart (HWH) is the compassionate arm of the Unionville Men's Hockey Club that is proactively engaged in making a positive difference in the Markham/Unionville community. Their goal is to make the community a better place by supporting those in need and lending a helping hand to those less fortunate or going through a difficult time.

Funds raised by Unionville Men's Hockey Club participants in the 2018 HHTH York Region Tournament were divided equally to support both 360° Kids and Hockey With Heart. Initiatives that HWH supports includes a donation of their own to 360°Kids, Christmas Food Baskets for families in need, assistance for UMHL players, and more.

YOUR IMPACT IN VANCOUVER

THE SALVATION ARMY (\$58,000)

CARGO VAN (\$33.000)

HHTH will fund the purchase of a cargo van to improve the ability to collect and transport small donations to support the Harbour Light's Community Meal Program which provides free and nutritious meals to over 400 homeless or at-risk clients.

BELKIN HOUSE (\$25,000)

Your funds will upgrade and replace old and vital kitchen equipment, including a steamer, two deep fryers, and storage racks at the Belkin House Shelter. Throughout the year, they serve over 100,000 meals, with three meals daily to shelter clients and transitional residents.

FIRST UNITED (\$55,000)

CART STORAGE FACILITY (\$30,000)

Your funding will build program sustainability to continue the storage facility service. Having a secure place to keep their belongings gives people the ability to access services, address their health concerns, seek apartments, and go to work. It is a low-cost transformative service for people in need.

COMMUNITY HELP DESK (\$20.000)

The Community Help Desk offers an umbrella of services for the city's most marginalized. These services include health & hygiene supplies, phone & mail service, community referrals, on-site medical visits, and more. Two dedicated staff and a rotating team of volunteers serve over 1,000 DTES community clients each year & aim to make the support services as empowering as possible.

TAX PROGRAM (\$5.000)

Your donations will help First United process the tax returns of up to 4,000 lowincome people who are either homeless or precariously housed. Staying upto-date on taxes is critical for rebuilding credit, receiving CPP & other benefits, and gaining access to many shelters. For those reasons, the tax program is a potential path out of homelessness.

RAINCITY HOUSING (\$38,000)

PICK-UP TRUCK (\$28.000)

Used by RainCity's Assertive Community Team, residents in their program will utilize the truck to move their belongings to a new place so it feels like home. It will also be used to get clients to doctor appointments, job interviews, shopping, and more to help break the cycle of homelessness.

HIVES FOR HUMANITY (\$10,000)

With HHTH's support, RainCity is able to continue this successful initiative which incorporates honey bee hives into 3 of their residential programs. By participating in this activity, tenants build new life skills and opportunities.

LAST DOOR \$50,000

Funding will be used to help cover the costs of addiction treatment in the Last Door Youth Program which provides an addiction treatment system for male youth ages 13 - 18. This will directly help youth alleviate the costs of treatment until they are able to access a government-funded bed.

COVENANT HOUSE (\$50,000)

RIGHTS OF PASSAGE (\$40,000)

By supporting the Rights of Passage Program, HHTH will immediately be helping approximately 30 homeless and at-risk youth find somewhere safe and stable to live where they will feel accepted and loved. The unique program provides youth with a community – a place where they feel a sense of belonging and where they can develop connections with caring adults.

CRISIS PROGRAM (\$10,000)

Your donations will help support the Women's Crisis Program which acts as an intervention for vulnerable young women ages 16 - 24. It provides free support services that meet the unique needs of each youth, which include: 24 hour safe, gender-specific housing with daily meals, clothing and hygiene supplies, guidance with goal setting, and on-site program staff.

BLOOM GROUP (\$40,000)

COMPUTER LABS (\$22,000)

With your generous donation, women and their children at the Powell Place and Springhouse emergency shelters will gain safe access to reliable technology that was almost otherwise impossible due to homelessness and poverty. This access will allow organized skill-building programs, completion of necessary applications, and let children gain technology skills.

FAMILY PROGRAM (\$18.000)

HHTH will help fund the Springhouse Family Program where fun outings and activities are organized to help children at Springhouse have a healthy and positive experience at a time of significant change and transition in their lives. Unlike traditional day camps, their mothers are encouraged to participate and have fun which strengthens the bonds between them.

ZERO CEILING (\$10,000)

TRANSIT PASSES (\$5,000)

Thanks to you, Zero Ceiling will purchase transit passes for youth in the program so they can secure and maintain employment in Whistler.

INDIVIDUALIZED SUPPORT (\$5.000)

By providing individual and professional support to the young people in the program, they will be able to access counselling sessions, physio, and other one-off expenses the participants may not be able to afford themselves.

URBAN NATIVE YOUTH ASSOCIATION (\$65,000)

By helping to cover staffing costs in the AYF Sports & Rec. Program, it will increase the capacity to reach out and engage Native youth who are homeless or at-risk and connect them to the diverse supports available at UNYA. Through all the activities offered, UNYA's AYF program has engaged 450 individual youth with over 1.200 visits to programming.



LOOKOUT HOUSING & HEALTH (\$50,000)

Your funds will gid in the purchase of a mobile bed bug heat trailer to treat infestations at multiple Lookout sites. Not only will this be an effective & costsaving method for treating infestations, it will also provide their guests with valuable skill training and experience, as well as provide supplemental income.

WESTMINSTER HOUSE (\$44,000)

In 2018, Westminster opened a home that accomodates 5 young women who have trouble with addiction and offers long-term residential support and stabilization. With HHTH's funding, Westminster House is able subsidize a bed for lower income families and provide treatment to young girls who require

YOUR IMPACT IN MONTREAL

AJOI (\$35,300)

Action jeunesse de l'Ouest-de-l'Île is an agency focused on young people experiencing homelessness. HHTH's donations will furnish rooms in 16 new apartment units for at-risk youth aged 18-35 years old, provide rent support for AJOI's bunker and support homeless youth's cellphone fees in order to give them guick and easy communication access to AJOI's outreach workers.

DANS LA RUE (\$55,000)

Montreal tournament funding helped increase mental health support and services for homeless or marginalized youth in the community. With HHTH's help. Dans la rue brought in a full-time specialized mental health intervention worker at their emergency shelter and funded 50% of LGBTQIA initiative to build up their training and current services offered.

AUBERGE SUD OUEST (\$15,000)

Auberge Sud-Ouest provides support to young adults aged 18-35 who are experiencing, or who are at-risk of experiencing homelessness. Your donations provided Auberge Sud Ouest new furnishings and a number of minor repairs in their shelter. They were also able to buy basic camping gear and accessories.

ANNE'S HOUSE (\$40,000)

Nazareth House/Anne's House provides a safe shelter, food and clothing to 28 women while teaching them the life skills needed to obtain secure housing, employment and education. MAISON TANGENTE (\$10,000)

Maison Tangente is on a mission to end youth homelessness. They work to support youth age 18-25 while they face homelessness and help them on their journey to independence. HHTH donations were used to renovate Maison Tangente's flooring in their common room, provide support kits for individuals moving into apartments and to purchase a new washer and dryer for their shelter.

OLD BREWERY MISSION FDN. (\$50,000)

HHTH supported Old Brewery Mission Foundation's Projet de reaffiliation en itinérance et santé mentale (PRISM) which serves as an innovative model in the field of homelessness and mental health. It is a six-week intensive program that focuses on providing shelter, psychological, medical and psychiatric support to homeless men and women suffering from severe or persistent medical disorders with the goal of providing re-integration.

WEST ISLAND WOMEN'S SHELTER (\$9,762)

West Island Women's Shelter supports women and children escaping situations of abuse. They provide them with a safe, temporary place to live while they heal. They also offer various support services while they live in the shelter and afterwards. HHTH funded a brand-new safe space intervention room from the West Island Women's Shelter where mothers and children can freely express their emotions in a welcoming, judgment-free environment.

REDWOOD PARK COMMUNITIES (\$60,000)

HHTH funding will be used to support three initiatives/projects from Redwood Park Communities. Thanks to your donations, 72 families including 142 children were supported through Redwood Family Support Team, which off-sets the cost of community events for families to encourage social interaction; 42 families including 126 children were provided rent support through the Redwood Rent Supplement Program and 18 new housing units will be built as part of the New Housing Unit Creation in partnership with the Bayside Mission and second suites program.

Through these projects, individuals, families and children will have a safe, secure and affordable place to call home where they can build a strong, vibrant and hopeful future.

DAVID BUSBY STREET CENTRE (\$60,000)

Proceeds from the 2019 HHTH Tournament helped support the operation, expansion and maintenance of the David Busby Centre's 24/7 community drop-in centre and social service programs. The David Busby Centre serves thousands of individuals and families in the Barrie community who are at-risk of, or experiencing, homelessness and offers them a number of different housing-focused programs including emergency group lodging, a community mobile outreach program and a new supportive housing project to assist individuals and families find safe, affordable and sustainable homes.



Net proceeds from the inaugural Mississauga Tournament have gone directly towards Raising the Roof's RESIDE program which re-purposes and renovates vacant homes to prevent homelessness. The goal of this initiative is to increase the number of affordable housing units available to individuals who are at risk of, or experiencing, homelessness. Renovations of the Caledon property, known as "Cedar Mains," began in the winter of 2017, and is a shining example of what Reside is able to accomplish. Building has been progressing and the home is expected to be eady by late 2019/early 2020.

Not only does this initiative provide affordable housing – it will also create work for vulnerable young individuals. Building Up is a non-profit social enterprise that offers training and employment in the trades to individuals who are facing barriers to employment. As a result of HHTH's donation, individuals are given the opportunity to receive in-class training provided by Building Up, as well as gain practical experience working on the Reside homes.

Additionally, the impact of HHTH's contribution extends to Reside's future tenants. Upon completion, the properties will be used to house individuals who are either at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness. In particular, the Cedar Mains property will house females with disabilities with support from community partner agencies to help live independently.

Toronto's Bay St. Tournament set a fundraising record this year, granting \$465,000 to Eva's Initiative. At each facility, youth work alongside Eva's staff to develop a personalized action plan to achieve short and long-term goals, including personal goals and those related to housing, employment and education. Eva's works to transition youth out of homelessness permanently and into a brighter, better future.


Your funds will go towards Eva's Safe Shelter and Essential Supports program. Their emergency shelter provides young people with a safe roof over their head and 24/7 crisis support to meet all of their immediate needs including access to housing, food and healthcare.

Funds will also help maintain Eva's Recreation, Health and Wellness Program which gives youth access to physical activity, excursions, artistic programming and engagement in sports to promote physical, emotional and mental health. Through this program, youth will also have the opportunity to build their leadership skills and create community connections to help them develop a true sense of belonging. 

THE MUSTARD SEED (\$112,500)

The Mustard Seed works to deliver basic services, housing and employment programs to help rebuild the lives of those in need.

HHTH's 2019 funding supported their Mosaic Centre a community hub located in north central Edmonton. The Mosaic Centre supports nearly 100 people per day and over 8,000 unique individuals, offering those in-need and families immediate access to the emergency relief programs, as well as long-term services focused on transformational change.

JASPER PLACE WELLNESS CENTRE (\$112,500)

The Jasper Place Wellness Centre (JPWC) also benefited from your fundraising in Edmonton. The JPWC is a community development organization that has been working to support vulnerable individuals in Edmonton since 2006. They have five primary focuses in the community: housing/development, employment, education, healthcare and food security.

HHTH's funds were put towards the operation of their medical clinic to promote better wellness and health outcomes in Edmonton communities. The funds will help cover staffing costs, clinic office and medical supplies, utilities and rent.

YOUTH OPPORTUNITIES UNLIMITED (\$50,000)

Youth Opportunities Unlimited (YOU) supports youth aged 15-29 in the London-Middlesex area to build their skills, confidence and independence through their transitional housing program. The grant from HHTH's 2019 London Tournament will allow 30 youth or more to reside in YOU's Cornerstone building, where they offer affordable and supportive housing to youth experiencing, or at-risk of, homelessness. Upon entering the program, tenants will be assigned a housing support worker to help them learn to live independently, establish life goals, and develop critical life skills in order to pursue education or employment and break the cycle of homelessness.

MERRYMOUNT (\$50,000)

Merrymount is a caring organization committed to providing around the clock support and crisis care for children and families. The donation from the 2019 tournament supports Merrymount's Children Centre's Crisis Residential/Respite Program which services children aged 0-12 over a temporary period of family instability and works with the family to cope with the present crisis and plan for adequate care for the children upon their return to home. The program not only provides care for children in a safe, nurturing and consistent environment, but it helps children develop social skills, build resiliency and improve their overall self-esteem and well-being so they grow up to reach their full potential.



UNITY PROJECT (\$50,000)

Unity Project aspires to serve people seeking shelter and support by providing 24-hour access to an involved and caring staff and their support services. HHTH supports a number of initiatives from the Unity Project including facility upgrades and their volunteer program. Upgrades include the instillation of new air conditioning units, new crash bar fire doors, and reconfiguring stainless steel cabinets for a cleaner kitchen space. These upgrades are critical for the Unity Project to provide a safe, dignified and well-maintained haven for the homeless. Funding will also go towards their volunteer program which engages over 40 compassionate students from colleges and universities in London, as well as community volunteers, to provide invaluable training and work experience to the next generation.
